

EUCHARISTIC STANDARDS AND PRACTICES

The host must be made of unleavened bread from wheat without additives following the tradition of Passover. The wine can be either red or white, must be made from the first press of the grapes and must contain at least 4% alcohol. It can be made from any grape and can come from either commercial sources or religious orders. No dispensation is granted for using non alcoholic wine for consecration or for making the host from other materials for persons with food allergies.

The wine is mixed with water to symbolize the mixture of blood and water that came from Christ's pierced side during the crucifixion. Symbolically three drops of water are added to the wine to represent the Holy Trinity. In the mixture the water represents the humanity and the wine represents the divinity of Christ.

In the early days of the Church, the Eucharist was reserved for special occasions and sometimes was only distributed to the clergy. The exact words spoken at the Last Supper have remained intact from the beginning; although the prayers in the Liturgy of the Eucharist have evolved over time. In some countries it is still common practice for the Eucharist to only be taken by the lay members on special occasions such as Christmas and Easter. Be thankful that in the US you have the opportunity to receive the Eucharist daily and try to take advantage of this spiritual opportunity.

GARDENING COLUMN

Deadhead crape myrtles to encourage a second bloom. Prune after final bloom.

Cut back leggy geraniums, impatiens, coleus. You can root the cuttings. Remove all but the four top leaves, dip in rootone; shake off excess and plant in Miracle Gro potting soil. Keep well-watered. In about two weeks you should have new plants.

Stop fertilizing shrubs, especially azaleas and camellias. Stop pinching mums back. Where there are multiple buds, pinch off all but one for larger blooms.

Cut back iris leaves to 6". If they need to be divided, dig up; cut with a sharp knife leaving at least 1 fan of leaves, a few inches of healthy rhizomes, and plenty of well-developed roots. Replant in shallow hole with a cone in center. Spread roots out over a cone.

Wait until late August or early fall if day lilies need to be divided. When replanting, be sure to leave plenty of room, so they won't need to do it again any time soon.

Prune back roses and fertilize lightly for larger blooms in the fall. Keep well watered. Usually the leaves should not be watered. However, with the extremely hot weather, they would appreciate a shower.

Many ornamentals may go semi-dormant or dormant during the hot weather. Don't neglect them, they are still alive and need moisture and nutrition. Many will come back with new growth and bloom in the fall.

Do not fertilize grass. Mow only if absolutely necessary. Raise mower blade for a higher cut. It shades the soil, keeps it cooler and lessens moisture loss. Grass needs up to 1 1/2" of rain a week. By using a rain gauge, you won't overwater. Brief sprinkles cause shallow roots that don't take the heat and drought.
