
My wife, Peg and I want to wish you and your families a very merry, safe and holy Christmas Season. May God bless and be with all of you always.


KNIGHT OF THE MONTH

GARDENING COLUMN

Continue to remove leaves on the ground and in flower beds because they can prevent air, light and moisture from getting to grass blades and roots.

Even though plants and shrubs are in a dormant stage, they require an inch to an inch and a half of water per week.

Keep newly-planted shrubs and trees well-watered. Cold and wind can kill dry plants. A good root system below ground needs to be established while dormant.

When it turns colder, prune any long branches that could damage the plant in windy weather. Spring-flowering shrubs and trees should not be pruned until after they bloom. Crape myrtles should be pruned before January 1. Do not do any major pruning at this time. It is a good

time to sharpen or replace the blades.

If you still have infestations of scale and aphids, now is the time to use Volck oil on shrubs and trees. It is thicker than the summer oils and will do a better job of suffocating insects and eggs. In colder temperatures, there isn't the danger of burning the plants. However, be cautious of nighttime lows, freezing temperatures shortly after an application of Volck can burn the plants as well.

Save favorite plants by taking cuttings now for replanting in the spring.

Lift potato-vine tubers. Store dry during the winter and replant in the spring.

Dead plants and branches should be removed. It can be a haven for disease and insect problems.

Clemson Extension has a new publication, "Life at the Water's Edge". It is a resident's guide to natural lakeshore and streamside buffers for water quality protection in South Carolina. It contains information on understanding the importance and dynamics of lakes, streams and watersheds in South Carolina. Chapters cover how to properly establish and manage a shoreline landscape, how to prevent fertilizer and pesticide contamination, and what plants are best for landscaping with charts of perennial grasses, shrubs and trees.

It suggest that homeowners should: leave a minimum width of 30-50 feet vegetated and free of fertilizers and other chemicals along each side of a waterbody.

Sketch a base map. Keep it simple and sensible; strive to keep the groundsurface protected and prevent rain and soil from washing into the water. Encourage densely rooted vegetation that will hold soil and soak up excess

nutrients. Use native grasses and

wildflowers. Herbaceous plants-particularly perennial grasses and flowers-should provide the foundation for any functional buffer that is planted from scratch.
