


Michael plays baseball for the nationally rated team and is majoring in Exercise Science.

### **GARDENING COLUMN**

Poinsettias need bright light but should be kept our of drafts. South-facing windows are a good choice in winter but plants may need to be moved in summer.

Water Poinsettias twice a week. Remove decorative paper to allow proper drainage.

The reason most plants die is from over watering. During the winter most plants aren't growing as much. Thus, less water is needed. A diluted water-soluble fertilizer should be used about every fifth watering.

Indoor plants add color and beauty to our homes. However, lighting can be a problem.

Most indoor plants will do well with East-facing windows. In winter, east windows receive more sunlight Christmas Cactus would do well here.

For indirect light, choose North-facing windows. They receive almost no direct sunlight. This is good for cyclamen, peace lily, Chinese evergreen or pothos ivy. South-facing windows receive lots of sunlight. This is good in the winter but plants may need to be moved in the summer.

Most of the sunlight comes through West-facing windows. The Norfolk Island Pine, weeping fig and rosemary topiaries would do well here. They may need to be protected in the summer.

Outside, dormant and semi-dormant plants need less water. They do need some moisture to stay alive. Don't cut or remove stems of perennials unless you are sure they are dead. If rain soaks into the cut stems, they may die of crown rot. Gerbera daisy stems should be pinched off rather than cut for this reason.

Plants that are still green should be watered. Hard freezes and cold wind will kill dry plants faster than if plump with moisture. Remember, potted plants dry out faster.

Spring-flowering bulbs should be planted as soon as possible. Wait until late January to plant tulips and hyacinths. These should have been refrigerated for at least six weeks prior to planting.

New trees and shrubs should be planted. Keep them watered to protect them from freezing temperatures and they will be well-established before the hot weather.

Pruning equipment should be prepared now. February 17-March 17 is the best time to prune most landscape and woody fruit plants. This is the optimum time for planting as well. The rule of thumb is: if it blooms before June 1, prune at last bloom; i.e., azaleas, forsythia, camellias. If it blooms after June 1, i.e., crape myrtle, prune before new growth in spring. Crape myrtle should be pruned now. Roses should be pruned at the end of January or the first part of February.
