

KNIGHT OF THE MONTH

The Knight of the Month or June is Paul Midghall. He is a Fourth Degree Knight and is an active member of Stella Maris Church, where he and his wife, Marianne, are daily communicants. Paul was very aware of the Knights of Columbus at an early age. He and his six siblings were beneficiaries of the Knights of Columbus insurance program. In 2003, Paul became an active member of Council 9475 and his life of service continues.

At the Parish level, Paul is involved with the Bible study group at Stella Maris and is an active member of the Men's Club. At the community level, Mepkin Abbey is the recipient of Paul's services where he is a docent and serves on the Store Management Committee.

Pope John Paul II declared 2005 as the year of the Eucharist and put out a call for action. Paul responded by servicing on the Year of the Eucharist Committee, which managed special studies, and Adoration of the Eucharist. As you remember, Paul was instrumental in organizing a one-day retreat centered on the Eucharist at Mepkin Abbey. Fifty brother Knights participated in that retreat.

HOLY EUCHARIST PRESENCE OR REALITY?

Before modern times, there were two major crises of faith in the Real Presence of Jesus Christ in the Eucharist. The first was in 1088 when theologians in France expressed doubt about the reality of the Blessed Sacrament. The second time was during the Reformation five centuries later. Pope Gregory VII ordered it a declaration of faith in the first instance. The Council of Trent again reaffirmed the Reality of the Christ in 1564. In modern times Pope Paul VI reaffirmed this belief as a cornerstone of the Catholic faith in his publication, *Mysterium Fidei*.

Reality is the doctrine that the Eucharist is Jesus Christ. Presence refers to the spirituality of the Host. Transubstantiation is the belief that what was bread and wine before the Consecration has become the body and blood of the Christ, while retaining their outer appearances. Thus, the fundamental belief of the Catholic faith is that the Eucharist is both the reality and the presence of Jesus Christ. A priest is not only a minister of the Word but is primarily responsible for maintaining our relationship with the Eucharist through the Consecration during Mass.

GARDENING COLUMN

Continue to pinch mums back until mid-July. Then, where there are multiple buds, remove all but one for larger blooms. Roses should be watered every 4-5 days and fertilized every two weeks.

Cut back and fertilize spring-flowering bulbs after leaves turn brown. If needed, divide.

If you see white cottony growth on new foliage of crape myrtles, it is powdery mildew. Spray with Banner Maxx or Fertilome Systemic Fungicide.

Always read labels. They give important information: What to wear when using. When to mow before and after using. Should product be watered in. How much to use.

Since Hurricane Season has started, inspect trees for damage. Trim any dead or damaged limbs now.

With warmer weather your lawn mower should be raised; for centipede - 2 inches; St. Augustine - 4 inches; Bermuda - 1-2 inches, Zoysia - 1-3 inches depending on the variety. Don't bag. Check for chinch bugs if you have St. Augustine grass. Damage will appear as dried out areas that are yellow to brown. Chinch bugs are very small-about the size of a period at the end of a sentence. Because they work as a group, they can suck the moisture out of the grass. You can use Lawn Insect Control, Leaf Ranger or Bifin IT to keep them in check.

To get rid of baby mole crickets (they can't fly yet) Mole Cricket Bait, Merit or Dylox products will work.

Be sure the lawn gets at least 1 inch of water a week.

Interested in a butterfly garden? Good plants for this are: Butterfly Weed (Monarch butterflies lay their eggs on this plant. The larvae feed on the foliage,) Butterfly Bush, Mexican Sage, For humming birds plant Bottle Brush, Alliums, Yarrow, Verbena, Bee Balm, Hibiscus, Plumbago, Honeysuckle and black-eved

Susan. Anything red will attract them. Be sure to include a water feature (birdbath) as well.

THE INSTALLMENT PLAN


Have you ever thought of buying money on the installment plan?
