#### **GARDENING COLUMN**

Grass should be watered deeply, at least 1" to 1 1/1" per week to promote a deeper root system. To reduce fungus disease it is better to water in the morning which gives the grass time to dry before night falls. The plant takes in more water before it drains through the soil below the root system.

Prune hydrangeas as soon as they finish blooming. Remember the blooms will be on second-year wood. When pruning, cut 1/3 of the limbs all the way to the ground each year. Use aluminum sulfate for blue flowers and lime for pink flowers. Prune gardenias and crape myrtles as soon as they finish blooming.

Geraniums should be cut back 1/2 to 3/4 per stem just above a node for more blooms and bushier plants. You can plant the cuttings in sand, or use rootone and plant in soil.

Leggy impatiens and coleus can be pinched back. A hard pruning will give them new life through late summer into fall. Mums should be pinched back until mid-July.

For more blooms, feed roses every two weeks. Roots should be watered every 4-5 days. In extremely hot weather, water foliage early in the day. When using systemic food and pesticides, be sure to wear long sleeves and gloves. It can be absorbed through the skin.

Dahlias and gladiola bulbs and other fall-blooming bulbs can be planted for fall color. Divide irises and Easter lilies after they bloom

Cut back foliage of spring-flowering bulbs when the leaves turn brown, then, divide and fertilize.

Wait until winter when trees and shrubs are dormant to plant unless you are willing to water frequently and deeply until they are well established.

The level of the lawn mower blade should be raised. Longer grass blades help shade soil and keep it more cool and moist. Never cut more than 1/3 of growth. Don't bag. Before going away, mow and edge lawn. Mulch as needed. Cut back blooms on annuals and perennials (you won't be there to enjoy them and this prevents them from going to seed,) fertilize lightly.

Watch azaleas and camellias for leaf galls, which are often caused by gall flies and wasps, They are primarily a cosmetic problem and should be removed by hand. They may also be caused by a fungus. Destroy galls as soon as they appear. You can use mancozeb sprays when growth resumes. Then, continue at 7-14 day intervals through June. Sasanquas are more of a problem than japonicas.

If you have orchids, it is time to put most of them outside. They will love the heat and humidity. Plants can sunburn, too. Begin in the shade and gradually move to sunnier areas. When fertilizing, use a weak solution, about 1/4 of the recommended dosage weekly. Don't forget to water.

#### FEAST OF CORPUS CHRISTI

In 1263, a German priest, Peter of Prague, while on a pilgrimage to Rome stopped to say mass in a church above the grave of St. Christina. He had been having doubts about the true presence of Christ in the Eucharist. During the Consecration, blood began to seep from the host and trickle down his hands. The blood stained the linen corporeal and the floor of the chapel. The Host and linen cloth were immediately transported to Pope Urban IV. With archbishops and cardinals in presence the bloody Host and linen were shown and a miracle was proclaimed.

The following year the Pope commissioned St. Thomas Aquinas to compose a Proper for the Mass honoring the Holy Eucharist as the Body of Christ. Thus, the feast of Corpus Christi was instituted in August, 1264. The enshrined linen relic and the blood stains can still be seen on display in the Cathedral of Orvieto in Italy.
