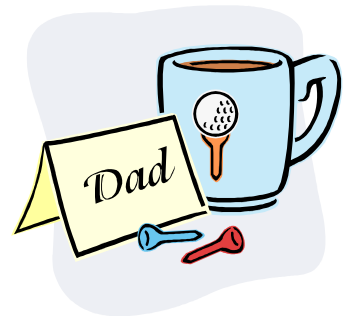
**June Gardening**

The grass is green, magnolias smell heavenly, roses are blooming, birds are singing and butterflies are floating from flower to flower. It's a great time to be in the garden. But, we are not alone. This is also the time when insects come out to enjoy the succulent leaves. Aphids, spider mites, scale, lace bugs, white flies, and mole crickets are a few of the pesty things we find.

Try to keep the use of insecticides as a last resort. Healthy plants are the best defense against pests and diseases. Some things we can do are; buy disease resistant and native plants, get rid of plants that require too much care, put the "right plant in the right place at the right time", water so that plants are wet for the shortest amount of time, water deeply and infrequently, avoid over fertilizing, get soil tested, apply lots of mulch, be sure plants have good air circulation, and give them soil containing plenty of organic matter. Remove and get rid of plant debris especially if diseased. Try to be tolerant and accept a little damage. Close monitoring allows you to control insects and diseases before they become a big problem. Spraying with a strong stream of water on top of and under the leaves can often control aphids, spider mites, and whiteflies. If that doesn't work try horticultural oil and/or insecticidal soap. Avoid spraying when the temperature is over 90. Japanese beetles can be hand picked and put into soapy water. (Don't use traps because they attract more beetles to your yard.) Get to know beneficial insects like ladybugs so you don't kill them. If you must use a pesticide, call the extension service to get help to choose the right one. 843-722-5940 Always read the label on the container and follow the directions. Do not spray when bees and butterflies are around.

With the temperature getting increasingly hot, gradually raise the mowing height of your grass to reduce heat stress. In the summer, mow St. Augustine at 3 1/2", Zoysia at 2", Centipede at 2-2 1/2", Hybrid Bermuda at 1 1/2". At the end of June, check for mole crickets in lawn. The raised surface from their tunnels (much smaller than moles') under the soil surface and the wilting of the dying grass are indicative of their presence. In early morning or evening, mix 2 T liquid detergent in 1 gallon of water and pour over a 1-2 square foot area. Watch closely to see if any come to surface. They are very small and might be hard to see. If they are in your lawn apply an appropriate insecticide after carefully reading the label. Several applications might be necessary. The best months to control mole crickets are June, July and August. Call extension service for insecticide suggestions.

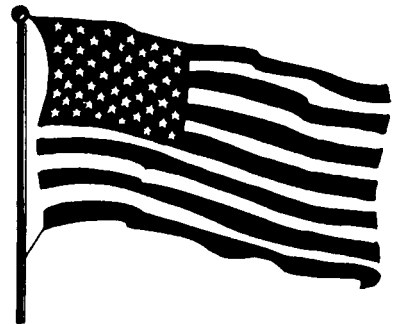
