GRAND KNIGHTS REPORT

Dear Brother Knights and Families,

On March 19, 1882, the State of Connecticut legislature granted a charter to the Knights of Columbus, formally establishing it as a legal corporation. The Order's principles were "Unity" and "Charity". The concepts of "Fraternalism" and "Patriotism" were added later. The Columbus-linked themes "reverberated with pride in the American promise of liberty, equality and opportunity" related historian Christopher J. Kauffman. William Geary, one of the Order's charter members, said that at the first council meeting in 1882, Father Michael J. McGivney was "acclaimed as founder by 24 men with hearts full of joy and thanksgiving, recognizing that without his optimism, his will to succeed, his counsel, and his advice they would have failed."

In keeping with the established tradition, our order will once again celebrate the International Knights of Columbus Day of the Unborn Child on the feast of the Annunciation. It will be celebrated on April 4th, since the regular feast day , March 25th falls on Good Friday this year. The Day of the Unborn was instituted as an addition to the Order's Crusade for Life and a symbol of commitment to building a culture that respects and protects every life.

Congratulations to our new Sir Knights John Gallagher, Mickey McMahon and Paul Midghall who were welcomed into our order's Patriotic Degree on February 26th.

GARDENING COLUMN

Time to clean out bird feeders and bird houses. Put out hummingbird feeders.

Do major pruning and planting before warm spring days. It's too late to prune crape myrtles. Wait until after they bloom. When pruning them, you should have 3-5 trunks. Any crossed limbs should be removed. Where there are 3 limbs, remove the middle limb. DO NOT CHOP. It invites infection that can kill the tree. Roses should be pruned and spraying started. Roses are susceptible to diseases and insects and require preventive applications of fungicides and insecticides to keep them in check. If honeybees are present, spray plants around dusk to avoid killing these essential pollinators. Other susceptible plants include azaleas, camellias (spray when not in bloom) and dogwood trees.

When azaleas and camellias have finished blooming, prune and feed. Replace with new mulch. Be sure to clean up any camellia blooms on the ground to prevent disease. Flats of summer annuals should be started for planting outside at the end of the month or in April.

If you plan to put houseplants out for the summer, they should be repotted now. This gives them time to adjust before being put outside next month.

Now is the time to apply pre-emergent herbicides on grass. Weed and Feed is NOT appropriate for this area. Fertilizer should NOT be applied until two weeks after the grass if fully green. Always read labels carefully. Do not dethatch centipede or St. Augustine until April or May.

Wait until after spring-flowering bulbs have bloomed to fertilize. Do not cut back leaves of early-flowering bulbs until they have turned brown. They need to build energy for next year. Wait to prune spring-flowering plants until after they bloom.

If summer and fall-blooming perennial clumps need it, divide and transplant now. Keep new divisions watered. "Harden off" bedding plants before planting by bringing them indoors at night for about 4 nights and taking them outside during the day. This will acclimate them to withstand still-cool temperatures. Unless it's unusually cold, St. Patrick's day (Mar 17) is a good planting date. Replace old mulch with fresh material. For perennial beds, wait until new growth is tall enough not to be buried before adding new mulch.
