
We have a special council, I thank you all for your hard work on His behalf. May God continue to bless you, your families, and our great country.


RECONCILIATION: MORTAL VS VENIAL SIN

The Catholic Church does not have an exact predetermined list of sins which meet the criteria of mortal sin. In order for a sin to be mortal it must meet the following criteria. 1. It must be a grave matter; 2. It must be committed with full knowledge of the gravity of the sin; 3. It must be committed with deliberate and full consent. In order to be a "grave matter" the sin must be a thought, word or deed which violates Divine law by offending God, our neighbors or ourselves. The gravity of the matter is judged from the teaching of Scripture, the definitions of councils and popes, and also from reason. Venial sin only impedes us from attaining everlasting life, while mortal sin prevents us from achieving that goal.

The concept of forgiveness through the sacrament of Reconciliation has changed many times in the history of the church. Current teaching is that only an ordained priest in a personal confession is allowed to forgive sins. That was not always the case throughout history. In the early church there were public confessions as well as private ones. General absolution was also given. And finally the act of self confession and confession to Deacons has been discontinued. Pope John Paul II confirmed in his writings that failure to amend following confession results in negation of the sacrament and immediately after death the souls of those who die in a state of mortal sin descend into hell.

GARDENING COLUMN

Prune spring-flowering shrubs, i.e., azaleas, camellias, forsythia, mock orange and climbing roses that bloom once as soon as they finish blooming. Fertilize. Crape myrtles and gardenias should be prunned and fertilized after they bloom. Crape myrtles should not be chopped off. If necessary, cut limbs back to a joint. Prune any limbs that are crossing other limbs.

Prune hydrangeas after they bloom. Cut no more than 1/3 of the hardwood back. Each stem should be cut all the way to the ground. Hydrangeas bloom on second-year wood.

to prevent disease, remove old mulch and replace with new mulch on ornamental and landscape plants.

Remove foliage of spring-flowering bulbs once it turns brown. Fertilize. Divide irises and Easter lilies after they bloom. Daffodils should be divided every three years.

Feed roses every two weeks. Feed new roses after first bloom. *According to Abide-a-while apply per bush:

Chelated iron (per directions); 1/4 cup of 10-10-10 or another balancedm fertilizer; 1 TBSP Osmocote (13-6-12) per foot of height at peak season; 1/2 cup epsom salts or magnesium sulfate

(encourages basal breaks as buds); 1 TBSP Miracle Gro for Roses + 1 TBSP fish emulsion or 1 cup of other organic material (fish, cottonseed meal, etc.) Start weekly spraying program. Use a fungicides to prevent blackspot and powdery mildrew.

When spraying, use a respirator; wearing long sleeves and gloves. When finished, wash the clothes you were wearing and take a shower. Divide established perennials. Pinch off dead blooms on petunias, snapdragons and marigolds to prolong bloom. Pinch leggy plants way back and fertiliz. For bushier plants, pinch mums back until July 1. Where there are multiple buds, remove all but one for larger blooms. Fertilize in July.

The normal garden requires 1 1/2 inches of water each week. Short sprinkles encourage shallow root growth, decreasing sa plant's ability to withstand drought. Therefore, water deeply fewer times each week. When planting trees and shrubs, don't plant to deep. There should be a visible root flare at the base of the stem or trunk. Roots that are buried too deep are deprived of oxygen. The top of the root ball should be level with or slightly above the soil. Keep mulch at least 3 to 4 inches away from the trunks and no more than 3 inches deep. When using a weedwacker around trees and shrubs, be sure not to hit the trunks. Plants in pots may be root bound; roots go around instead of growing down. Fine roots can be cut through vertically. Larger roots should be carefully teased and spread out.

Some plants that will attract butterlies and humming birds are; Pentas, Bee Balm, Black Eyed Suzannes, Hibiscus, Plumbago, Lantana, Mexican Sage, Verbena, Vitex, Glossy Abelia, Butterfly Bush, and Bottle Brush. Where possible choose Red rather than Yellow. Butterfly weed is a good host plant for the Monarch Butterfly. One caution with this plant; it reseeds itself and may show up elsewhere in the yard.
