



GARDENING COLUMN

Wait until it gets cooler to plant pansies and other coolweather flowers.

Water, deadhead, and pinch back summer flowers until cooler weather kills them.

An inch to an inch and a half of water each week is needed for the average yard.

To bring warm-weather plants inside, take cuttings now. For better results, use rootone before putting cuttings in sand or soil.

Clean up fallen leaves under shrubs to prevent diseases from wintering over. Mulch leaves because they deteriorate faster. Use fresh mulch to keep moisture in the ground and protect plants from cold winds and drying out. Never use more than four inches deep and keep away from trunks and stems.

Late December or early January is the best time to prune shrubs when they are dormant. Winter and spring-flowering shrubs, i.e. azaleas, sasanquas, camellias and forsythia should not be pruned until after they bloom. Prune crape myrtles before January 1.

To establish perennials before the first frost, plant them now.

Spring-flowering bulbs can be planted now. Use plastic netting or chicken wire just below surface to prevent animals from digging them up. Then, cover with dirt and mulch.

Remember: tulips and hyacinths require six weeks refrigeration before planting in January.

Prepare roses for winter: lightly prune very long canes, spray for insects and diseases, remove and replace mulch. Larkspur, sweet pea, poppy, and wildflower seeds can be sown where they are to grow.

Do not use fertilizers. Nitrogen encourages foliar growth which may be seriously damaged by a frost.

In order to bloom, poinsettias and Christmas cacti require long night/short.
