From The State Chaplain
Now we are in the midst of Lent and it is for each of us a very

important time. Lent is not a learning time as are the other seasons of the liturgical year. It is a time of special experience. We are called upon to let this season of Lent form our lives in a special way. We are to meditate and think deeply about our lives - our sinful lives and to form ourselves in such a way that we will have within us a strong sense of sorrow or penitence for our failures in life in the moral sense. We are all inheritors of the sin of Adam which we call the Fall of Man. We are not as God would have us be and we must prepare ourselves to be cleansed. That's a job we cannot do of ourselves. There is no way man can make-up for his sin. Therefore, God Himself, the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity, became a man in the person of Jesus Christ in order to be the perfect man who could indeed make-up for our sin. This He did by His full, perfect, and sufficient sacrifice on the Cross and victorious Resurrection on Easter. If we can become what He is we can share in the redemption He won. This we do by being baptized into His Mystical Body, the Church. He is the Church. We live in Him. He is our Redeemer and we share in that redemption by living in Him. Lent is the annual reliving of our need for redemption and the anticipation of the Death and Resurrection of Christ. So, you see, we really need to live out our Lent so that we will always know and want salvation and share in it with rejoicing.

The end of the twentieth century began to show us some disappointing things around us in the Catholic Church. There were some unorthodox writers and teachers who broadcast things like ordination of women, same sex marriage, lessening of discipline in the Church, disobedience to the magisterial teachings of the Church, sideshow liturgies, and some other things we may recognize. But the good news was there. It was proclaimed amidst the confusintg liberal nonsense coming even from some theologians. And, the new century begins with a firm proclamation by the Holy Spirit that the Truth of the Faith is protected and will indeed be proclaimed above the voices of confusion. It starts with Pope Benedict XVI. The Holy Spirit gives us the pope we need. He is the Shepherd who will follow in the path of the magnificent pontificate of John Paul the Great. This Pope will solidify all the teaching

From the Membership Director

February was another good month for membership. We brought in 56 new brothers and lost 13 for a net gain of 43. After a very poor start we are now at 194 net new or 60% of our yearly goal, very close to 67% year-to-date target. If we can continue this pace, we have a real chance of surpassing 100%. 14 councils have already achieved goal, 5 more are tracking, and an additional 14 have a genuine chance. Our pacesetters are 2207 Sumter, 6900 Charleston, 12263 Bluffton, 11991 Goose Creek, 9575 Spartanburg, 13713 Blythewood, and 7531 Conway, each over 150%. Unfortunately, 3 councils have had major "house cleaning", and, in addition, 8 councils have yet to sponsor.

The upcoming Spring Blitz is our major chance to catch up and go over 100%. About half of all new brothers we brought in so far this year came from the Fall Blitz. I cannot urge you too strongly to have a successful Spring Blitz and to schedule one immediately if you haven't already. In order to get prospects to first degree by June, your blitz should happen no later than the end of April. The most successful blitzes are pro-


moted in advance in the Parish Bulletin, and addressed at each mass on blitz week-end. Exit doors need to be staffed and names and phone numbers taken for immediate follow-up by membership staff. Then, get them the information they need and to a scheduled 1st degree as soon as possible. Keep it simple, but do it right with follow-up.

All Grand Knights and Membership Chairmen should note our worthy State Deputy's offer of green colored, embossed golf shirts for all of you who attain 100% by June 1st. 25 councils received gold ones last year and I see a lot of proud wearers at our state meetings. I expect a lot more winners this year. Will you be among them?

As a prideful side note, Brother Bob Gagne of St, James , Conway, reports that Brother Paul Mevissen, born 1/29/86, took his 4^{th} degree on Feb. 25^{th} , arguably our youngest Sir Knight. In 2005, Brother Dick Russo of St. Francis Hilton Head, born 11/21/11 took his, arguably our oldest Sir Knight. Any one who knows these brothers should give them your very best wishes.

You have my continued prayers that you have great recruiting and are able to retain every brother possible. Until we meet again, may He continue to hold you in the palm of His hand.

During the past few months, while on business travel, I have had the opportunity to attend different Catholic Churches in Norfolk, San Diego, Hawaii, and Guam. Not knowing the Mass schedules or church locations, my first attempt was try looking for a Church in the local phone book and try to correlate its location in reference to the Hotel. Just by chance while I was on the internet, I typed in "Mass Times" in the Google search engine. Lo and behold, I was able to enter a city and state and it quickly brought up a listing of all the Catholic Churches in the local area including Mass times, information about the Church, Church Bulletins, Parish web sites, directions and even maps. Health Services Byline

"Overactive Bladder and Urinary Incontinence"

The medical complex of an Overactive Bladder with urgency (with or without incontinence), with urinary frequency and nocturia affects all ages and genders. Note that some of these symptoms can be caused or aggravated by a number of GU tract infections, metabolic conditions, drugs etc. thus complicating and masking the true nature of these symptoms.

Occurring in about 15% of the general population, the hardest hit clinically are older individuals.

Remember that this medical condition is NOT normally a part of aging and searching for specific collateral and aggravating factors to treat can bring acceptable control and comfort in the urinary storage/bladder empting sequence involving the neurologic control mechanisms of the central neural system and those of the lower urinary neural system.

Pharmotherpy requires careful consideration of drug tolerances and interactions etc. that is to say that the treatment is tailored for a specific patient. Special attention should be focused on neurologic issues, GU, GI and GYN inflammations and infections, diabetes mellitus, diabetes insipitus, renal disease etc.

With a focused history and examination, and with appropriate lab testing, an experienced physician can select the optimal treatment program.

REMEMBER: Accurate diagnosis, obviously, can lead to effective treatment in the hands of a knowing physician who will use successfully his optimal therapeutic options (surgical, behavioral and pharmacological)



Not to pass judgment, but in our opinion, here are some examples of attitudes that could threaten one's well-being: "Abortion doesn't involve me....I'm beyond the child bearing age....It's not my place to tell others what they should or should not be doing in their private lives....I can't do anything about abortion....the Supreme Court has ruled it to be legal....My Congressman and my Senator do not listen to me, why should I waste a letter or phone call to them about life issues in America? There are more issues that determine who I vote for than just simply abortion. My family has always voted for Republicans, and I will continue to vote the same way....I don't want to suffer when I get seriously ill....I wouldn't want to live like Christopher Reeves...I'd rather they just pull the plug.....I want to die with dignity, so when my time comes, I'm going to refuse all methods of nutrition....I want to go quickly.....I don't want to be a burden on my family." It goes on and on.

We were listening to a middle-aged priest recently who alerted us to the problem of men who have actively helped their wives or girl friends have an abortion. These men feel extremely burdened by the guilt they are now experiencing in participating in such a horrible act. They are afraid to go to confession and receive forgiveness. The priest that was giving the talk explained how he personally understands the pain and anguish because before he became a priest, he participated in precisely this very act. It haunted him until he finally got the courage to go to confession and rid the stain from his soul. God so blessed the man that he was given a calling to the priesthood. He is now winning souls back to God through the priesthood and

has a special ministry of serving men who are hurting from their pain of killing their own child. The priest talked about the hundreds of thousands of men who are afflicted by this situation. It dawned on us that possibly some of our Knights here is South Carolina could be hurting and need encouragement to seek help. If so, the greatest day of your life will be when you go to a priest and tell him of your plight. He will gently find peace and forgiveness for you. Don't put it off, dear Brothers. Jesus is waiting with merciful arms to heal your wound and welcome you back into his fold in the most complete of ways.
