

KNIGHT OF THE MONTH AUGUST, 2006 John Gallagher

John was born in Washington, DC and grew up in a small town in Southern Maryland. At the age of 16, John became a volunteer firefighter and embarked on a volunteer career that would last for the next 22 years. In 1979, John became the youngest person to become certified as a Cardiac Rescue Technician (a precursor to today's Paramedic) in the State of Maryland. John moved up the ranks eventually serving as the Emergency Medical Services Chief for Charles County, Maryland for 4 years prior to moving to South Carolina.

While not volunteering, John received both his undergraduate degree from the University of Maryland and his graduate degree from Webster University in Information Systems Management and began his "paying" career with Booz Allen Hamilton, a consulting firm in McLean, Virginia where he developed a specialization in Information Security and later, Homeland Security and Homeland Defense.

In 1991 John met his wife Andrea, a school teacher, while she was working a summer job at the local hospital emergency room and they were married a year later. In 1996 their son, Ryan Jacob (Jake) was born.

John moved to Charleston in 1997 as a result of the base realignment and closure initiative to lead the Booz Allen Hamilton office supporting SPAWAR. John had visited Charleston many times over the years supporting the Navy and took a liking to the city, its hospitality and southern charm. Andrea, having never visited Charleston, took a leap of faith and agreed to the move and hasn't regretted the decision at all.

John is currently the Director for Program Development for BAE Systems, Inc. in Charleston. He lives in Mount Pleasant with Andrea and Jake and they attend Stella Maris on Sullivan's Island. John joined the Knights in 2003 and advanced through the degrees. John was inducted into the Fourth Degree in February 2005. John has been actively involved in various Council activities, currently serves as Deputy Grand Knight for #9475 and is a member of the District 9 Second Degree Team.

GARDENING COLUMN

Cut back roses, geraniums, impatiens, petunias, coleus and begonias for good fall color and more blooms. You can root the cuttings.

If possible, deadhead crape myrtles after flower heads fade to encourage a second bloom.

Now is the time to order tulips. Order early, mid-season and late blooming bulbs for a longer blooming period. In the south, tulips and hyacinths require at least 6 weeks refrigeration before planting.

To prevent infestation of scales, spray camellias unless it is too hot. If so, wait until October.

Plant chrysanthemums now. Sow seeds for fall annuals; such as pansies, calendulas, dianthus, larkspur, stock and snapdragons.

Divide and replant perennials if necessary. Allow enough space that they won't have to be divided again any time soon.

Take cuttings from non-hardy woody plants such as hibiscus, butterfly bush and mandevilla.

Overgrown shrubs can be cut back for appearance only. You may lose some of the blooms. Wait until after they bloom for any severe pruning. If new growth is light green, use cheleated iron to "cure" the chlorosis. Read labels. May not be appropriate if over 90 degrees. The best control for fungus, insects and pests is good sanitation. All can winter over in leaves, grass clippings or mulch. Now is the time for cleanup.

Life Insurance Awareness Month

September is Life Insurance Awareness Month. To help educate consumers about the need for and value of adequate life insurance protection, the Life Insurance Market Research Association (LIMRA) has published the following five facts. These statistics are certainly worth considering.

Fact 1: Nearly three-fourths of North Americans agree that life insurance is the best way to protect against premature death of the primary wage earner.

Fact 2: Twenty-four million households have no life insurance protection at all. Almost one third of adults have no life insurance protection.

Fact 3: Forty-four percent of all households either don't own life insurance and believe they should, or own life insurance and believe they need more. Among those that already own some life insurance, 40 percent believe they don't have enough.

Fact 4: One-fourth of primary wage earners feel they do not have a plan in place to provide a decent standard of living for their family if they died tomorrow. Twelve percent of families would immediately have trouble meeting everyday living expenses and another 15 percent would have difficulty keeping up after several months.

Fact 5: People would like to discuss life insurance with a financial professional. Consumers feel buying life insurance is an important and complex financial decision. Half of them find it difficult to decide how much to buy, and 43 percent worry about making the wrong decision.
